7th Annual Read Together Middle School Challenge

The Diamond Bar Friends of the Library sponsored the 7th Annual Read Together Middle School Challenge on Tuesday, October 25, 2011 in the Clarke Theater at Mt. San Antonio College from 6:30p.m.to 8:00 p.m. Golden Springs, Chaparral, Lorbeer, South Pointe and Suzanne Middle Schools competed in the Jeopardy-style contest answering questions about “The Secret Life of Bees” by Sue Monk Kid. At the end of four fast paced rounds, Chaparral emerged the 2011 champions.

They received a plaque for their school and their name on the perpetual plaque at the Diamond Bar Library. All team members and advisors received school tee shirts to wear at the competition and each team received individual certificates and \$250 for their school libraries.

The contest is designed to promote literacy, a love for reading and provide friendly competition between the schools. The students also have the opportunity to compete at a college campus. Each event has been a spirited exchange for all the teams.

Studies have shown that practicing reading to a pet is less stressful for children than reading to a teacher, parent, or peer. We think this is a great—and fun!—way to encourage and support young readers. As always, our Teen Services Librarian Joshua Murray is offering a variety of programs for tweens and teens. Every Tuesday and Wednesday at 3 PM teens can find programs featuring videogaming, art activities, animated films and more. The library also continues to offer a special program for adults the last Saturday of each month. Recent events have included a cake-decorating demonstration, an urban farming workshop, and a Korean cooking demonstration and tasting. What is the Diamond Bar Friends Spelling Bee all about?

Scripps National Spelling Bee

The Scripps National Spelling Bee is the nation's largest and longest-running educational promotion, administered on a not-for-profit basis by The E.W. Scripps Company and regional spelling bee sponsors in the United States, American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Department of Defense Schools in Europe; also, the Bahamas, Canada, China, Ghana, Jamaica, Japan, New Zealand and South Korea.

The purpose of this program is to help students improve their spelling, increase their vocabularies, learn concepts, and develop correct English usage that will help them all their lives. Regional spelling bee sponsors conduct community spelling bee programs, usually in cooperation with school officials for public, private, parochial, charter, virtual and home schools. The champion of each local spelling bee sponsor's program qualifies for participation in the Scripps National Spelling Bee near Washington, D.C.

Inland Valley Regional Spelling Bee

The Inland Valley Regional Spelling Bee (IVRSB) is one of about 280 worldwide sponsors who conduct spelling bee programs for the purpose of qualifying regional champions to participate in the Scripps National Spelling Bee program.

The IVRSB conducts the regional qualifying bee for 27 communities and 22 School Districts in the LA Basin/San Gabriel Valley ranging from the 605 Freeway eastward to Fontana, along the I210 Freeway, I10 Freeway, and the California 60 Freeway Corridor. This geographical area includes approximately 400 Public, Private, and Parochial Schools.

The competitions at all levels are conducted in English, and the competitors are English speaking students ages 14 and under, and in the 8th grade or below. Go to www.spellingbee.com to see rules for Regional or Local Bees, including details on eligibility.

2012 IVRSB

March of 2012 marks the fifth year this event has been produced by the Diamond Bar FOL. The event has grown in size and prestige each year. This year, the IVRSB will again be held on the Mt San Antonio College campus, and we anticipate enrollment in the program will exceed 100 schools. As usual, we will name a champion of the IVRSB, take steps to prepare our champion for the national competition (tutoring and study sessions), and send our champion and a chaperone to Washington DC to compete in the Scripps National Spelling Bee.
